California Buckwheat

Eriogonum fasciculatum



Description: California
Buckwheat blooms for months,
and butterflies are attracted to
the dense clusters of cream and
pink flowers on its large landing
pads, aka large flower heads.



Light: Full Sun



56 species of butterflies and moths can lay eggs on this plant.



Featured Butterfly: When not sipping nectar from our native buckwheat blossoms, the beautiful green *Lotus Hairstreak* butterfly can be seen perching on the ground along pathways. Watch for it from March through May.

Keystone Plant: This California native is a "must have" (host) plant for caterpillars, which, in turn, are the "must have" food for baby birds.
