
Beaked Hazelnut

63 species of butterflies and moths can lay eggs on this plant.

Featured Moth: During its caterpillar stage, the *Spotted Tussock Moth* eats the leaves of hazelnut, birch, willow and oak trees. Watch for adult moths in your garden in the evening from May-July and caterpillars from July-September.

Keystone Plant: This California native is a "must have" (host) plant for caterpillars, which, in turn, are the "must have" food for baby birds.
