## **Showy Milkweed**

Asclepias speciosa



Description: Showy Milkweed has distinctive flowers which are attractive to bees, butterflies and other pollinators. Its thick, fuzzy leaves provide food for the caterpillars of the endangered Monarch and Queen butterflies.



Light: Sun or Part Shade



**2** species of butterflies and moths can lay eggs on this plant.



Featured Butterfly: Western
Monarchs can be seen in gardens
across the West from March through
November, sipping nectar from a
variety of flowers and laying eggs on
milkweed. For the remainder of the
year they cluster in overwintering
sites along the California coast.

**Keystone Plant:** This California native is a "must have" (host) plant for caterpillars, which, in turn, are the "must have" food for baby birds.
